The magnet and grapple are used to facilitate separation of recyclable resources (including ferrous metals) from Construction and Demolition waste and shredded mattresses. This task was previously performed manually. Utilising the magnet and grab reduces risk and allows staff to focus on other responsibilities on-site.

NEW RECYCLING HUB FOR MURRAY BRIDGE

BRING IN YOUR BOOKS, BATTERIES AND BIFOCALS!

The Murray Bridge Library is now home to a Recycling Hub which is shared with the Rotary Club of Murray Bridge. Feedback from the community to date has been overwhelmingly positive.

Tim Law, Senior Library Officer and avid recycler (shown above) has welcomed the Hub as an additional service that the library can provide for the community.

The Recycling Hub strengthens the efforts of the Brinkley ReUse Centre (owned by the Rural City of Murray Bridge) to divert resources from the Brinkley Landfill.

The Brinkley ReUse Centre diverts an average of 1.5 tonnes per week of materials back into the community!

IN OTHER NEWS...

SOFT PLASTIC RECYCLING ON THE HORIZON FOR SA

The Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water and Green Industries SA have announced a new project funded by the Recycling Modernisation Fund. \$20 million dollars will be used to establish a facility in Kilburn, 'Recycling Plastics Australia' (RPA).

RPA expects to process and purify over 14,000 tonnes annually of soft plastics, diverting from South Australian landfills. Shopping bags, chip packets, and food wrappers will be recycled to produce material for new soft plastic packaging.

It is expected that RPA should be open for business two years from now. That allows two years to determine the most efficient method of collecting plastic from the community and transporting it to RPA. It also allows time for the development of end markets for the recycled material.

Soft plastics collection and recycling is just one half of the story. South Australia has also continued to eliminate unnecessary plastics via the Single Use Plastics Bans which have been incrementally rolled out since 2021. The most recent bans (under the *Single Use and other Plastic Products Act (2020)*) include thick plastic bags, bread tags and single use coffee cups.

But that's not all! The Australian Government is also advancing soft plastics recycling through new national packaging laws, which will ensure that packaging is designed with recovery, reuse, recycling, and reprocessing in mind.
